Over the years the work has expanded immensely and yet there is so much more to do!










## LYKA MOVES TO THE U.S.A.

It was during one of our medical missions in 2015 that a little 1-year-old girl was given to our care. She was covered in boils and was obviously fragile and unhealthy. Her name is Lyka. Her mother passed away when she was a baby so she was left in the care of a relative who equally did not have the means to raise her properly. With such inadequacy, Lyka grew malnourished. She was forced to eat solid food which was mainly rice mixed with water and salt at a very young age. When Lyka's aunt came across our organization during the medical missions, she decided to give Lyka up so that her medical needs would be met. She came to us for temporary sheltering, however, no one claimed her back later on and so she was officially surrendered to our care.

While we know that being in our care is better for children who suffer the effects of poverty, it is always heart-breaking that families break because of it. Lyka stayed in our care for many years. During her first year with us, she was a sickly child. She had pneumonia, stomach parasites and was malnourished. We took care of her. This little girl grew up well and stayed with us for seven years.

No one claimed her back after her medical treatment. She was with us for seven years.







She became independent and wonderfully curious about many things. Lyka loved to play with other kids and she had no problems when playing alone too. Our caregivers remember her as a warm and sweet girl who showed appreciation boldly.

It was in 2018, Lyka was five years old, when we started her adoption process. It was an arduous journey of two years and five months. The COVID-19 affected the whole process but we pushed through.

Finally, the time came on August 20, 2021, Lyka met her dad and mom for the first time!

It was a heart-warming and tearful event. While we felt sad to let her go, joy filled our hearts more because Lyka got what she deeply longed for. Two days after, she flew to the U.S. and has even started going to school there.

As dark as the backgrounds many of our children have, there is hope. Finding families for our kids, even though it takes a long time and demands so much effort, is what makes it all worth it.





#### BREAK THE VICIOUS CIRCLE OF POVERTY WITH EDUCATION!

The COVID-19 restrictions forced children worldwide to complete their schooling in front of a PC, online. Since our children come from difficult backgrounds of horrible abuse, abandonment and child trafficking, they often have difficulties in concentrating or understanding. Because of this, a very intensive learning support and tutoring is usually necessary for them to learn better. This special support is only possible through personal interaction.

In a real classroom, teachers can instruct much clearer and assist better. Therefore, we have decided to build a school in Village of Hope for approximately 150 children who live with us there. 240,000€ are needed for this. We are so grateful that 180,000€ have already been donated for the school.

## **FIRST HARVEST**

The 2.8-hectare of land which we have been working on is now about 65-70% cleared and it is being fully used for planting various fruits, vegetables and root crops. Corn, sweet potato, turmeric ginger, cassava, okra, beans, papaya, banana, chilli, cucumber and squash among many others are what we have planted in our new farm.

We have also moved our incinerator and garbage management facility by the farm's elevated area, a rocky hill, where our waste can be organized, recycled or disposed properly.

We have also moved there most of the animals we have been taking care of. All our ducks and goats freely roam the farm grounds and eat all that they can find. These efforts help us have a more sustainable supply of food so that our children can eat healthy and organic.





# HOUSE BUILDING PROJECT IN CALERO

The 21-year-old Quirara grew up in a poor family. She did not finish school and, eventually, married early. Quirara currently lives in Sitio Pulo, the little island community which we have been helping out more intensively since COVID-19 pandemic started.

Life is challenging in Sitio Pulo because its terrain changes drastically every year. During summer, its surrounding area is dry and fit for planting and harvesting crops such as rice and corn. However, during rainy and typhoon season, Sitio Pulo turns into an island, surrounded by non-potable, polluted water. The livelihood there then turns into planting and harvesting water spinach. Aside from this change, the biggest problem that the 70 families in Sitio Pulo has is the housing. They have no match against the strong typhoons that threaten to destroy or damage their makeshift houses made with scrap materials of thin plywood, rusted galvanized iron sheets and worn out tarpaulins.

This was Quirara's situation. She and her husband, Rommel, has a two-year-old son. Their main livelihood is to harvest water spinach and sell them for a cheap price at the local market. This would earn them 2,50€ a day, enough for two meals which Quirara tries her best to fit for all three of them. Mostly, nothing is left for other expenses.

Quirara and Rommel's family suffer damages to their house every year.


We met Quirara during one of our disaster relief projects in Sitio Pulo. She shared, "I have been saving money for two years to replace our tarpaulin roof with more durable galvanized iron sheets. I have been praying for someone who would add to my little savings so that I can buy materials." Ouirara's iov uncontainable when she found out that she was one of the 36 families who would construction materials receive and assistance to reconstruct their houses so it can stand a better chance against the series of typhoons every year.

Our work in Sitio Pulo will continue on. For now, we set-up a community water filtering system so that the water surrounding their community during rainy seasons can be fit for consumption. Aside from this, we conduct relief distribution whenever needed.

# HOUSE OF FAITH

Pushing through projects proved to be a challenge in 2020 because of many COVID-19 restrictions that limited our activities in the Philippines. But while it was a struggle, we are grateful to haved pushed forward with our work. It is our desire to serve more children and care for more of those who are disadvantage. For that to happen, we needed to add more houses in our Village of Hope. In 2020, we started the construction of our fourth children's house and with the support of many, it was finally finished and furnished in July 2021!

We named this fourth house as our House of Faith because it was built during trying times and yet it came through! By the month of August, our kids happily moved to this new house and enthusiastically brought their belongings and together they arranged the space, its furnitures and fixtures so they could all enjoy it.

With our House of Faith, we can welcome new children who are in need of shelter, love and care!

### LIVE GOD'S LOVE

We are grateful that our work in Tondo is still on-going and that we were able to find new ways to serve the needs of people despite the many limitations imposed in that area.

Enrique, one of our sponsor children's 62-yearold grandfather, shared with us that it was through one Sunday Service that he came to know Jesus Christ. It was through our educational support for his grandson, Ivan, when he came to realize that "God is truly faithful" to him in his own life. He felt this because when it seemed hopeless, help came.

The family does not only receive scholarship from us but also supplies of rice and grocery. Ivan lives with them while his mother works her best to make ends meet, she earns 5€ a day to feed her three children and elderly parents. Despite the hard life they have, Enrique appreciates deeply every help they receive, not just physical and financial needs but spiritual too.



Margie, a 32-year-old mother of three children who are all in our educational sponsorship program in Tondo, shares with us that her husband lost his job as a garbage collector when the lockdown started in March 2020.

He was the only one who earns money for the whole family and receive 30€ a week for his arduous job. But all those were lost. She testified with obvious gratitude in her heart,



"Aside from the scholarship my children receive, we also receive consistent supplies of rice and groceries as well as school supplies ... it came to a point, when the pandemic started and everything was closed down, we had nothing much to eat, but Vision Help came to our aid. ... It is a great relief for our family to have our basic needs help. I am also thankful that my children can continue going to school even when it's online."

To share the love of Christ is our utmost goal and over the years, we realized how holistic our approach must be so that people may come to know it fully. This means that while we do our best to proclaim the Truths written in the Bible during our Sunday Services, Bible Studies and Evangelistic activities, we put forward practical help to the people of Smokey Mountain and its poor neighbouring communities as equally important. God's love are not just communicated in words but in concrete action. And all these are possible because of your continued partnership with us. Thank you.
